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Defining Literary Métissage



- Progression of reflection, conversation and synthesis of ideas for the co-creation knowledge while building community
- Steps
 - 1. Identification of an issue of social concern
 - 2. Sharing reactions in conversation
 - 3. Reflecting and writing a personal response
 - 4. Sharing written responses & selecting lines that resonate
 - 5. Consensually (Horn-Miller) nominating and braiding lines
